The Greek stem anti, which we define as meaning against, actually can have a wide variety of meanings, and is sometimes changed to anto or ant. Anti can mean against, prevent, opposite, reverse, hostile to, counteract, or even rivaling. Here are some of the interesting words that contain anti in its various shades of meaning:

antibody: protein that neutralizes an antigen. His antibodies helped fight the disease.

anticlimax: a ludicrous conclusion. The ending of the play was a pathetic anticlimax,

an upward bend in rock strata. The hill was actually based on a slate anticline. anticline:

anticoagulant: drug that prevents clotting. He was given an anticoagulant to dissolve the clot.

antifebrile: reducing fever. Aspirin has an antifebrile quality.

antihero: an untraditional protagonist. The new cynicism produced film antiheroes.

antilogy: a contradiction. The discussion was really a juxtaposition of antilogies.

antimatter: opposite particles. For every proton, there may be an antiproton.

antinomian: belief in faith alone. Antinomians demand more than obedience to moral law.

antipathy: strong dislike. Achilles's antipathy for the Trojans seemed implacable.

antiseptic: preventing infection. She used an antiseptic to prevent infection in the wound.

antivenin: an antitoxin for venom. They had no antivenin for the rattlesnake bite.

antonym: an opposite word. She thought synonyms were easier than antonyms.

antonomasia: the use of epithets. Antonomasia was the custom in "His Honor's" court.

antidote: a poison remedy. They administered the antidote in time to save his life.

antinovel: a radical novel. In his antinovel, he violated the traditional forms of the genre.

antipode: the exact opposite. Their views were antipodes of each other.
